Common Challenges

- Other priorities: Across ASCEND cities, a shared challenge is that citizens perceive energy balances as disconnected from their own concerns. This complicates their engagement.
- **Funding engagement:** Identifying an economic model to fund engagement and co-creation strategies remains a difficult task for most cities.

Main Takeaways

- The PCED's explicit ambition to achieve a positive energy balance must be paired with other implied goals that speak more to the inhabitants' priorities. The energy transition can thus be leveraged as an instrument to improve quality of life, rather than as an isolated goal.
- There is a need to identify the specific objectives of citizen engagement. While there is consensus about its importance, clarifying its specific goals in each location will help develop effective strategies.
